From the desk of the Administrative Chair

On a recent Sunday morning broadcast on National Public Radio, the host interviewed British composer, artist, and activist Brian Eno. In this interview he put forth several ideas that are relevant to our curriculum and Waldorf education. In his interview he said, "A *cappella* singing is about the immersion of the self into community. That's one of the great feelings—to stop being me for a little while, and to become us." He continued, "A recent long term study conducted in Scandinavia sought to discover which activities related to a healthy and happy later life. Three stood out: camping, dancing and singing." Anyone familiar with the curriculum that we deliver at Waldorf schools around the world recognizes that we realize the importance of all of these activities. He concluded his interview with the following: "So I believe in singing to such an extent that if I were asked to redesign the British educational system, I would start by insisting that group singing become a central part of the daily routine. I believe it builds character and, more than anything else, it encourages a taste for cooperation with others." When I encounter such opinions, I often want to shout out that Waldorf educators have been using this approach for more than 80 years.

This is another busy week. On Wednesday and Thursday, the children will visit the Winter Garden. Parents and friends are invited to visit it on Wednesday afternoon (December 3) between 2:30 and 3:30 p.m. On Saturday, we will host our annual Holiday Fair. The committee has worked hard at planning an exciting and wonderful experience. There will be the usual events: Rudolf's Diner for lunch; the two cafes for sweet treats; the children's shopping room; the Winter Walk; and student vendors, and some exciting new traditions. One significant new feature is a silent auction. It will include many interesting experiences to bid on. Please plan to spend some time at this important event.

The Winter Garden

As we approach the Winter Solstice, the darkest time of the year, many traditions celebrate with festivals that bring light into the darkness. Lighting the Advent candles, the Chanukah candles, the Yule Log, the Kwanzaa candles, and the Christmas tree all remind us of a miracle of light—be it a lamp that stayed lit for eight days, the return of the sun, or the birth of the Christmas child—that came in a time of darkness. At Waldorf Schools worldwide, we celebrate this time of year by walking the spiral pathway in the Winter Garden.

To symbolize the darkness of the winter days, the Winter Garden is lit by only one candle at the center of a spiral of green boughs. After hearing a seasonal story, each child walks the spiral to its center carrying an unlit candle. In the center an Eighth Grade Angel helps each child light his or her candle. Then the child retraces the path, placing the candle along the spiral, amid the boughs. Hidden amongst the greenery are treasures, which may be crystals, stones, stars, seashells, or other delights. As the candlelight grows ever stronger, these

treasures begin to sparkle in the darkness.

The mood of the Winter Garden is one of wonder, peace, and joy. The Winter Garden will take place on Wednesday, December 3 and Thursday, December 4, during the school day for the students. On Wednesday December 3, the Winter Garden will be open to families and community members from 2:30 to 3:30 p.m.. We warmly invite you to enjoy this magical experience.

Financial Aid applications for 2009-10 school year

The Waldorf School of Baltimore is committed to seeking a diversity of backgrounds and incomes within its community and offers a financial aid program to help accomplish this goal. Awards are made to students whose families qualify for aid on the basis of financial need. Families who are committed to providing a Waldorf education for their children but are concerned about their ability to pay the tuition should consider applying for financial aid. It is not possible to determine if a family qualifies for aid without the information provided by the application process; however, families currently receiving grants have average incomes between \$60,000 and \$120,000. Some families receiving grants fall outside this range. Many factors impact a family's

eligibility for a grant and the size of the grant, including number of dependents, number of tuitions, assets, extraordinary circumstances, the amount of financial aid available, and the school's needs.

The deadline for applying for financial aid for the 2009/10 academic year is January 5, 2009. Instructions for applying, supplemental forms, and the link (www.nais.org/go/sss) to the NAIS School and Student Service Online PFS (Parent Financial Statement) are available on the school's website www.waldorfschoolofbaltimore.org. On the Admissions homepage, click on Admissions, then Financial Aid to reach the financial aid information. FAMILIES CURRENTLY RECEIVING
