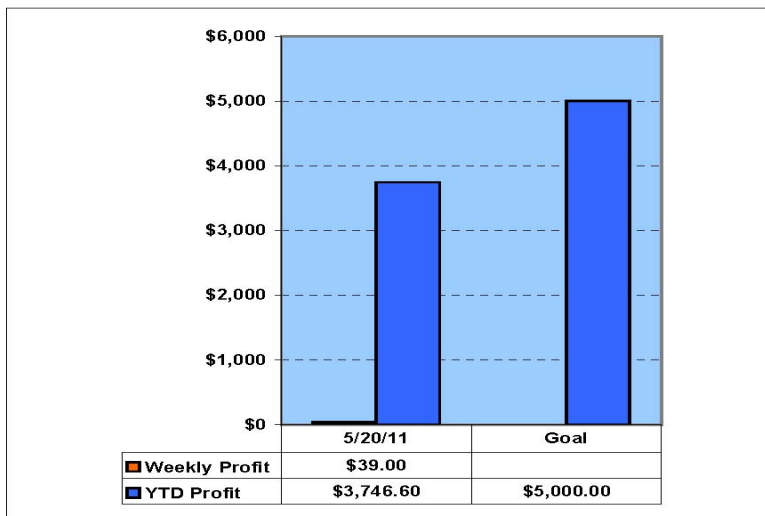

Muddy Waters: WSB Science Experiments reported in UNESCO newsletter!

Remember last week's report on Marian Perry Tamburrino's class participating in the International Year of Chemistry? Here's how it was reported internationally in the UNESCO newsletter:

"Tenth grade chemistry students from the Waldorf School of Baltimore recently participated in the International Year of Chemistry Global Water Experiment. The stu-

dents collected samples from the Cylburn-Waldorf stream that feeds the Jones Falls watershed and eventually winds up in the Baltimore Harbor and Chesapeake Bay. Samples were analyzed for pH, nitrates, phosphates and turbidity.

Results from the students' work will be posted online and shared with other schools from all over the globe in what is being billed as the



world's largest science experiment ever.

The Imaginary Invalid: About the play

In its original form, *Le Malade Imaginaire*, Molière's last play, is a three-act comedy. It was first performed in 1673 and was the last work he wrote.

The plot concerns the attempts of Argan to marry off his daughter, Angelique, to a mate who will serve his needs for relentless doctoring. The doctor he has in mind (Thomas Diafoirus, the nephew of his own doctor), turns out to be a buffoon with no social skills.

Argan's second wife, Beline, is a gold-digger, content to encourage Argan's hypochondria as she attempts to cut his two daughters out of his will and have all his money for herself.

Toinette, the maidservant, much to Argan's frustration, insists that he is not sick at all!

Cléante, Angelique's true love, sneaks into the house disguised as her music teacher. He pretends to improvise an opera with her, in order to woo her under her father's nose.

Beralde, Argan's brother, argues on behalf of the match with Cléante, but their discussion is interrupted by the arrival of the Apothecary, come to administer Argan's enema. Beralde persuades Argan to postpone

the treatment, but this only enrages Dr Purgon, who had prescribed it. He cancels the marriage of Angelique to his nephew, withdraws further treatment, and predicts Argan's imminent death.

This turn of events gives Toinette the excuse to disguise herself as a doctor and have some fun mocking the advice Argan has received from other doctors.

When Beralde suggests that Beline may be less than the devoted wife she pretends to be, Toinette (as herself again), suggests that Argan pretend to be dead, to demonstrate how grief-stricken Beline will be. Instead, his wife is delighted and attempts to steal Argan's money. When she finds her husband is still alive, she runs off in horror.

With Angelique approaching, Toinette suggests another test, and Argan plays dead again. His daughter is sincerely stricken by news of her father's "death" and Argan is persuaded to let her marry her true love, Cléante, if only he will become a doctor. Beralde, however, suggests that Argan become a doctor himself. He takes advantage of a visiting troupe of actors to stage a mock ceremony in which Argan receives his medical degree, swears allegiance to the backward principles and bureaucracies of medi-

cine, and then dances off merrily, forgetting his chronic illnesses.

RSVP: tracy@urbanitebaltimore.com. In its continuing mission to educate the public about living sustainably, the Waldorf School of Baltimore will host a screening of the film *Gasland* by Josh Fox. This shocking documentary takes an uncompromising look at the effects of recent "hydrofracking" drilling in the western states. It provides fair warning to those of us living in the Marcellus shale gas region, a geologic formation that stretches through West Virginia, Maryland, Pennsylvania, and New York. The Marcellus region is the target of the next wave of natural gas drilling. Is "fracking" as safe as they say it is? Is it the answer to our energy security needs? The Halliburton-developed drilling technology called "fracking" or hydraulic fracturing has unlocked a "Saudi Arabia of natural gas" beneath at least thirty-four states. When filmmaker Josh Fox is asked to lease his Pennsylvania land for drilling, he embarks on a cross-country road trip to find the answer to these questions. A recently drilled town near his home reports that residents are able to set their drinking water on fire. This is just one of the many absurd and astonishing revelations about a new country called *Gasland*.
