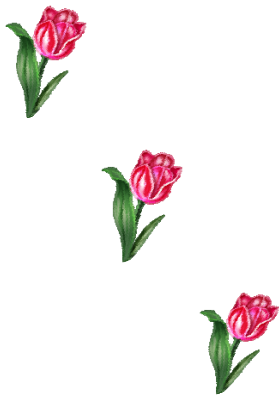

## From the desk of the Administrative Chair

The last week of school is always a busy week for the faculty, staff and the students. On Wednesday, there will be a guided tour of the exhibition of woodwork and handwork projects from 2:30 pm. until 3:15 p.m. in the hallways of the Tamarind Building. This will be an opportunity to see the work of many students on display and to talk with Cate Mulvihill and Edna Emmet about the curriculum and the work on display.

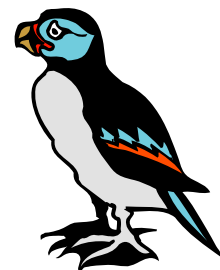
