## From the desk of the Administrative Chair

I have been observing the drop-off and pick-up lines at the main entrance to the Tamarind Building, and there are several things I would like to point out. At drop-off in the morning, if you need to walk your child into the building you need to park in the designated parking areas on the west side of Tamarind Road or north of the school on the east side of Tamarind Road. If you are unloading an instrument, you should wait until you can pull to the north end of the line. I have also observed parents not crossing their children at the crosswalk. This is dangerous with the amount of traffic on Tamarind Road, and sets a bad example for the children. At pick-up you must stay with your car if you are in the pick-up line on the east side of Tamarind Road. Please do not park your car near the playground thinking that the line will not reach that far. It reaches that area every day, and a parked car causes dangerous traffic situations. If after drop-off or pick-up you need to go in the opposite direction on Tamarind, please do not make a u-turn. Proceed to the north end of Tamarind Road and turn around at the entrance to the parking lot for the Park View at Coldspring apartments. Again, with the volume of traffic at drop-off and pick-up, u-turns create dangerous traffic conditions. Please, if you have someone other than yourself dropping off or picking up, make sure that they are familiar with the procedures.

Be sure to come to the Michaelmas celebration on Wednesday, September 29. The pageant will be presented at 8:45 a.m. on the field opposite the Yellowwood Building. It lasts about 45 minutes. In the afternoon there will be tugs of war between the children beginning at 1:45 on the same field. These last for about an hour.

## SCRIP News

One of our parents shared a copy of the e-mail she sent to her family and friends and it seems like such a good way to get others to participate in Waldorf's SCRIP program that we wanted to share our version of her letter with you:

Hi everyone,

John's school is trying to get more involvement in this great (and painless) way to raise funds. Basically, the "SCRIP" program is a way to purchase gift cards that can be used in making purchases from many companies, from Whole Foods to LL Bean, Starbucks to Barnes & Noble. The gift cards work just like cash. You don't pay extra for them. Stores don't have to pay anything to accept them, thereby avoiding the 4% to 6% fee per transaction they pay when people use credit cards. Each company donates a specific percentage of the value of the card *directly* to Waldorf School of Baltimore, which you will have to make the designated school (see the directions below). Some companies donate as much as 12%, and some run specials from time to time: At one point last year, LL Bean offered to donate 20%, which I took advantage of, purchasing cards worth

\$200. That amounted to a \$40 contribution for the school. It was so easy. I just use those cards to buy clothes for John and myself.

The SCRIP program is very flexible: You don't have to use the cards within a specific time frame. You can use SCRIP for sale items and for shopping online or in stores.

**It's a win, win situation for everyone:**

**For You:**

- You are *not* being solicited for additional fundraising.
- You **are** spending normally—nothing extra and shopping where you normally do—example, iTunes, Starbucks, Shell gas, Wal-Mart, etc.
- You *can* give them as presents: Mary, you can get cards for national chain stores like Children's Place and The GAP and send them to Jane and Joe.
- You **are** helping John's school (which operates on a shoestring with very minimal administration and overhead costs) get money that directly supports John's education.

**For the Merchants:**

- SCRIP works just like cash for them. Everything is electronic—but it's money with no fees.
- They don't have to get ripped off by credit card companies
- It brings them customers.

**For the School:**

- Money to do all the great things they do. What could be better?

Setting up an account and purchasing SCRIP are done online. One thing: You are required to pay through your checking account or savings account, because they **don't** use credit cards. That's how they are able to avoid those fees and make this a great program. The cards you order are released by the scrip coordinator on Monday and they are then sent to school for your pickup every Friday. They also have this great new system where you can actually print the "card" on paper—like an airline eTicket.

I have participated in Waldorf's SCRIP program for the last two years and have had no problems at all. This

outside to partake in the Tugs of War. Parents are welcome to watch and cheer from the sides of the field. It is a lively and exciting event for all.

## Children's Garden Autumn Garden Festival

Our Autumn Garden Festival is celebrated every year at the end of September or the beginning of October. This year's festival will be on Wednesday, October 6.

There are many festivals to mark the seasonal turning points (solstices and equinoxes). These festivals bring images that are part of the universal human experience, such as harvest festivals in the autumn. Our Autumn Garden Festival marks the end of the growing season and the celebration of the bounty of the harvest. This is the time of year when human beings must find strength and courage to enter the months of cold and darkness, bearing within themselves the light and warmth that were in the outer world of nature in summertime. The Archangel Michael, who defended the good, is a picture of

this strength and courage for the children. When the children enter the Autumn Garden, they experience the beauty and wonder of nature that is displayed throughout with flowers, cornstalks, gourds, pumpkins, tree branches, etc. The children are escorted by the Autumn Fairy through the Garden, where they meet Michael and Mother Earth. Each child receives a cape, a crown, an apple, and a bulb to plant.

In the Waldorf nursery and kindergarten, the seasonal festivals form the framework of the curriculum. The children are nourished by the images and mood of the festival activities, and by the earnestness with which the adults work to find expression for the relationship between the human being and the changing forces of nature.

For the Autumn Garden Festival, parents are needed to take on the roles of Michael and Mother Earth. Let your teacher know if you would like to help in this way. There will be a sign-up sheet outside the Willow and Butterfly classrooms for these roles. If any parents have flowers, potted plants, pumpkins and gourds, etc. to share for the Festival display, please bring them in the day before the Festival, on Tuesday, October 5. Label items you want returned. The teachers will send home details as the date approaches.

## Report on Upper School exchange in Spain

Last spring, from April to June, I had the pleasure of going overseas to Spain with the high school exchange program. I lived in Madrid and went to school in Madrid and I was able to experience a strangely different, but in some ways surprisingly similar, way of life. An interesting thing that stood out to me as different was first of all, everything and everyone there was smaller, the cars, the streets, the people, all except the portions of the food which were very large. I enjoyed the Spanish culture; to me it seemed much more free, for there was al-

ways public transportation for any place you would like to go and parents had a lot of faith in the systems. I liked going to school and meeting new people, but by far my favorite part of the experience, and the part I am sure I will value for the longest, is the history and culture I experienced. In Spain all the architecture I saw was beautiful, and while walking through the older cities such as Toledo you could almost feel the centuries of events swirling around you. Such places give you the imagination to see the past as a play in front of you. The

castles and palaces were very grand, and the artwork lining their walls was stunning. I had a chance to see an Aqueduct while in Segovia and I found it very inspiring. When I was in the younger grades I had always really enjoyed the studies of the Greeks and Romans and to me; seeing the Aqueduct made the stories more real.
